
- 2 Area of the country where earthquakes are most likely to occur.
- 4 Large destructive wave caused by an earthquake in the ocean.
- 6 Small earthquakes that follow the first earthquake.
- 7 Notice given when a tsunami had not yet been verified, but could exist and may be as little as an hour away.
- **9** Notice given when a tsunami may be close to your area. Usually includes predicted arrival times and expected arrival areas.
- **10** The area closest to where the earthquake occurs.
- **11** The first of the three safety actions you should take when an earthquake occurs.







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

ACROSS

- 2 A loud indicator of possible flooding.
- **3** Occurs when a river, stream, or lake overflow its banks rapidly, often without warning.
- 6 Take this with you if you have to leave your house in an emergency.
- **10** Directions specific to you and your family that you follow when a flood or other emergency occurs.
- **11** Do this in a pool, not in flood waters.

- 1 Listen to this for news and directions when the power goes out.
- 4 Only use bottles for this, never flood water.
- 5 Issued to alert you when flooding is about to happen or had already occurred.
- 7 Can be a cause of flooding.
- 8 Can be a cause of flooding when a cold areas, such as mountains, warm up quickly.
- **9** Issued to alert you that conditions are favorable for flooding.

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












- 1 Issued to alert an area of the possibility of a hurricane developing within 36 hours.
- 4 Leaving your current structure to seek safety elsewhere.
- 7 Month hurricane season ends.
- 8 Listen to this to obtain accurate information and directions when the power goes out.
- **10** Document that outlines what your family will do in response to a hurricane.
- 11 Issued to alert an area when sustained winds of at least 74 mph are expected within 24 hours.

12 Month hurricane season starts.

- 2 Take this with you whenever you leave your home in an emergency
- **3** Take cover in your current structure.
- 5 The rapid rise of ocean water levels.
- 6 The calm center of a hurricane.
- **9** A hurricane that occurs in the Pacific Ocean.





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
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

- 1 This sound is often used to describe the sound of a tornado.
- 4 Keep these closed in your home when a tornado occurs.
- 5 Made up of Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas, this is the nickname for the area where tornadoes are most likely to occur.
- 8 Issues to alert you of the possibility of a tornado developing in your area.
- **11** A siren system used to alert you of approaching bad weather.
- 12 Common color of the sky when a tornado occurs.

- **2** Use this to listen for news about the weather and for instructions on what to do.
- **3** Issued to alert you that a tornado has been sighted in your area.
- 6 Violent wind storms with a twisting, funnelshaped cloud extending from a thunderstorm to the ground.
- 7 Last month of tornado season.
- 9 First month of tornado season.
- **10** Do not try to outrun a tornado, especially riding this vehicle.








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
