William Howard Russell was a newspaper reporter who wrote many articles on Florence Nightingale for the London Times. In Florence's day, printers formed the words with metal letters called type. When all the words were formed, the type was inked and a sheet of paper was pressed against it. The printed pages were easy to read, but if you looked at the set type and not the paper, everything read backwards.
