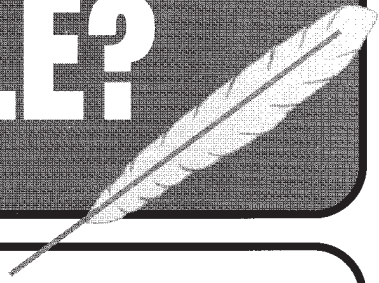

YANKEE WHOODLE?



***Yankee Doodle came to town,
Riding on a pony,
Stuck a feather in his cap,
And called it macaroni!***

This is one of the most well known songs of the colonial war era. Yankee Doodle has a very interesting background. Some people say it started as a British children’s song, and when the soldiers came to America to fight, they brought the song with them.

“**Yankee**” is the name the British came up with for the colonial soldiers.

“**Doodle**” is a British term for a dumb, foolish person.

“**Macaroni**” is not the food we eat. Instead, macaroni is a kind of knot used to keep things together. So, what the song is really saying is...

***Foolish, American soldier
came to town,
Riding on a pony,
Stuck a feather in his cap,
And tied it with a knot.***

The Americans liked this song and created their own lyrics to sing of their bravery:

***There was Captain
Washington,
Upon a slapping stallion,
A-giving orders to his men,
I guess there was a million!***

***And there I see a bombing
shell,
As big as mother’s basin,
And every time we set it off,
They scampered like the
nation!***

There are at least fifteen known, American verses to the tune of Yankee Doodle.

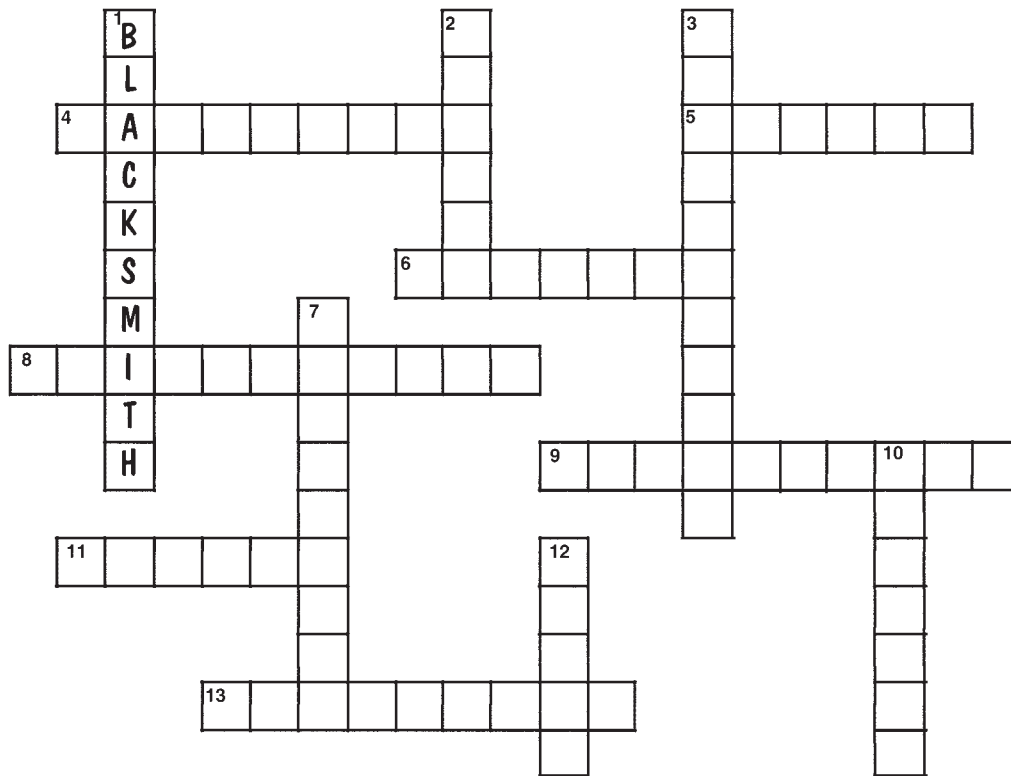

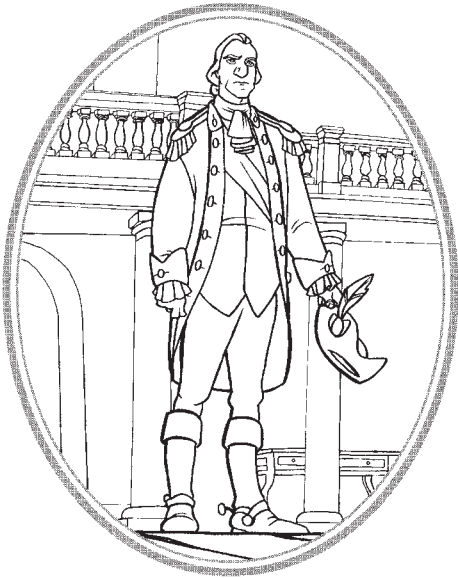

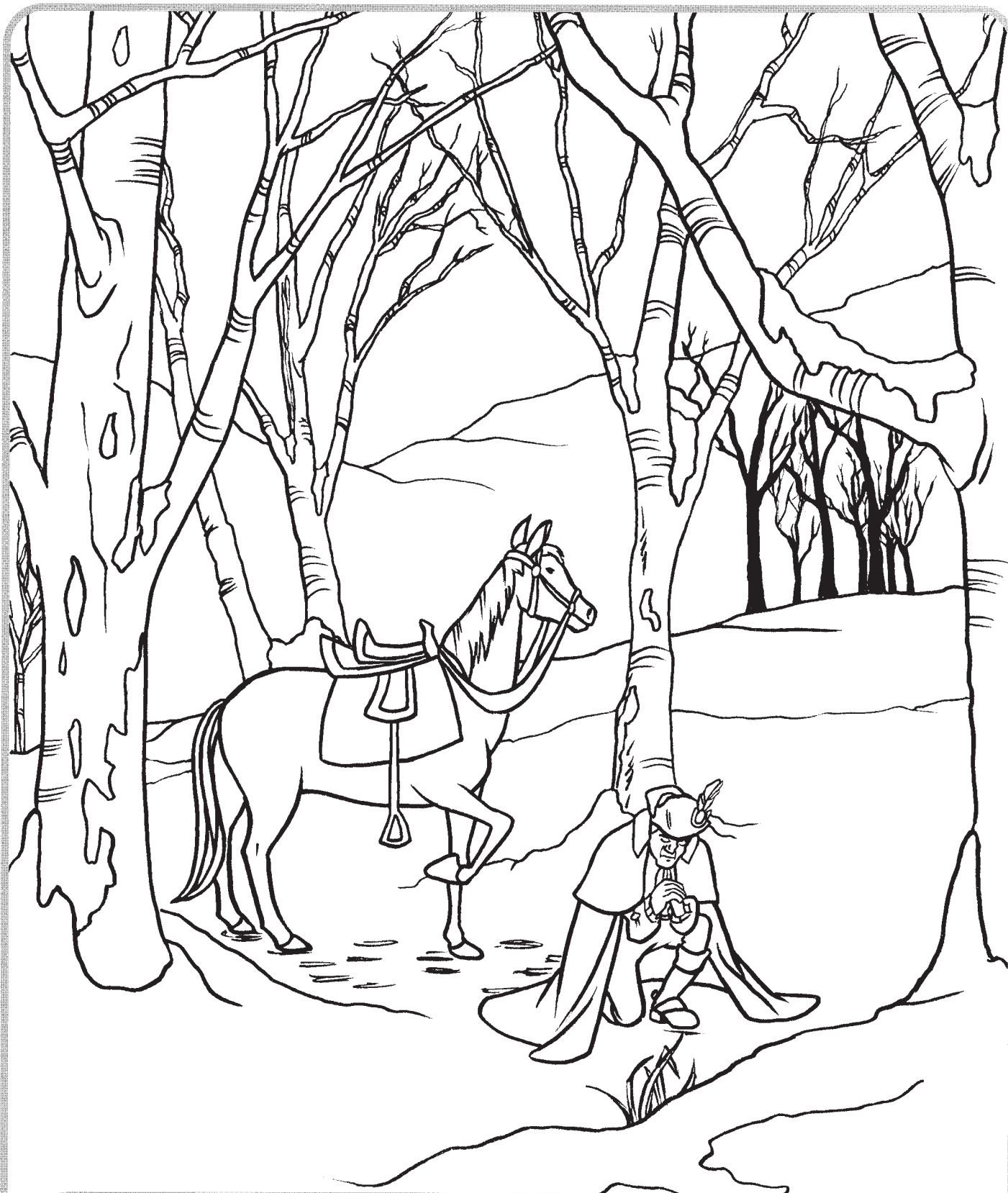

Children often went to school for three or four years only. After their schooling was compleated, boys learned a trade, such as carpentry. Girls learned how to sew, cook and keep house.



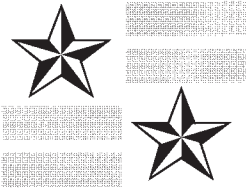

DRUMS ALONG THE DELAWARE



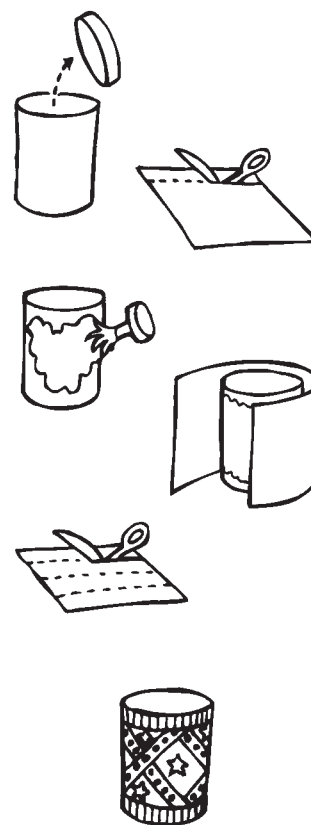
There were many tribes of Native Americans living in America during colonial times. They used drums for several different things, such as singing, dancing and telling stories. They also used drums when they went into battle, just as George Washington's army did. Below is a list of materials and instructions to help you make your own Native American drum.

YOU WILL NEED:

- Rubber cement
- Felt-tip markers
- Glue
- Scissors
- Oatmeal box (or two-pound coffee can)
- Construction paper (many colors)
- Small, multi-colored beads
- Pencils or small sticks (to be used as drumsticks)

HOW TO MAKE A NATIVE AMERICAN DRUM:

- 1** Remove the lid.
- 2** Cut the paper so it fits completely around the can or box. It is all right for ends to overlap.
- 3** Apply rubber cement all the way around the outside of the can or box. Let it dry.
- 4** Attach the construction paper to can or box.
- 5** Cut long strips from the leftover pieces of construction paper. Glue these strips in a "criss-cross" pattern on the outside of the can or box.
- 6** Use your marking pens and beads to finish decorating the drum. Put the lid back on. Use pencils or sticks for drumsticks. What does that sound like? Beat on the drum with your hands. What does that sound like?





MORE *than* ONE

THINGS TO DO

NOTE TO THE TEACHER: These are activities for a group to discuss and think about.

1. Pass a dollar bill around for group to examine. Discuss whose picture is on it and why.

2. Show a picture of the flag used by the Continental Army during the war, and compare it to the present flag of the United States. Discuss why the flag used during the Revolutionary War looked the way it did and how it is different from our flag today. Have group make paper flags to display.



3. Discuss the winter of 1777-78 at Valley Forge. Explain that it was very cold and that many soldiers wrapped rags or whatever they could find around their feet because they had no shoes to wear. Rags, etc., could be wrapped around feet of group members to help them gain a better appreciation of what the Continental Army sacrificed to gain freedom.

4. Discuss the lack of food and supplies at Valley Forge. Ask group how long they have ever gone without food. Have them imagine what it would be like not to have any food for a long period of time.

5. Discuss the type of clothing worn by George Washington and the Continental Army. Make paper hats similar to those worn by the Continental Army.

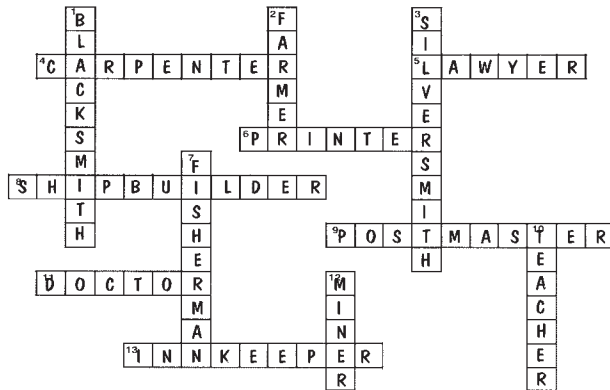
